

A yes-machine, not a gate.

The anatomy of an AI Center of Excellence: what it owns, what it only advises on, how it gets funded, and the four ways it quietly stops governing. **Same framework as the episode – one page, no video required.**

WHAT IT OWNS vs what it only advises on

ADVISES ON

Pattern choice, roadmap order, prompt design. A good opinion – the team can take it or leave it, because the real decision sits elsewhere.

OWNS

A verdict nobody can route around, no matter how senior the sponsor is. If every "no" is just advice, nothing is actually governed.

Six decision rights map to this (full list: Season 1 Episode 2). One is load-bearing – who approves a use case before it's built. **Advisory there means five rights and one well-produced opinion.**

THE FUNDING TEST how it's paid decides whether it can refuse

PROJECT-FUNDED

Chargeback, or a budget renewed on utilization. Every use case parked is a line that doesn't get charged and doesn't get logged.

STANDING CAPABILITY

A base budget set once at the portfolio level. Renewed on outcomes, not on yeses – refusing something costs nobody their funding.

You cannot ask a function to say no to the thing that pays its own salary, reliably, and expect it to hold. **This is the one lever that makes refusal mechanically possible.**

FOUR WAYS IT BREAKS you'll recognize at least one

IVORY TOWER

Beautiful standards. Almost nothing ever ships.

BOTTLENECK

A real gate, too slow. Teams quietly build around it.

RUBBER STAMP

Zero requests ever declined. Not a track record – a tell.

SHADOW COE

Real approvals happen in a DM the register never sees.

THE THREE ARTEFACTS a CoE you cannot audit is a story about one

USE-CASE REGISTER

Every request that came through intake, including the parked and the declined. Winners only is a highlights reel.

PATTERN LIBRARY

The vetted blocks new work gets assembled from. The test is usage, not existence.

MODEL & AGENT INVENTORY

What is live, who owns it, which autonomy tier. If that takes three people and a Friday, it does not exist.

THE METRICS IT REPORTS ON ITSELF the tell is which set it picks

VANITY

Workshops delivered. Pilots launched. Satisfaction scored by the same teams whose requests it approved. A rubber stamp scores beautifully on all three.

REAL

Share of intake declined or parked last quarter, reason on file. Median days to verdict. Production agents with a named owner, checked today.

MONDAY MORNING two minutes, no meeting

1 Find one real decline

Pull your intake log. One request, actually told no.

– Not delayed, not sent back with questions. If you find it, go read the reason on file.

2 If you can't find one

Don't decline something just to prove a point.

– Write one sentence: what would make you say no to the next request that walks in.
